Psychologist and evolutionary systems scientist David Loye is a former Princeton and UCLA School of Medicine faculty member. He is a co-founder of the multinational General Evolution Research Group; a co-founder of The Society for Chaos Theory in Psychology and the Life Sciences; co-founder with his wife, internationally known author and cultural evolution theorist Riane Eisler, of the Center for Partnership Studies (www.partnershipway.org); and founder of The Darwin Project (www.thedarwinproject.com), with a Council of more than 50 leading American, European, and Asian scientists and educators.

Currently, Dr. Loye is chiefly involved in the launching of two new online ventures inspired by *The Parable of the Three Villages*.

A goal for the development of **The Moral Transformation Network** (www.moraltransformation.com) is to provide a meeting place for people now worldwide seeking to wed progressive science and progressive spirituality into a firmly grounded, action-oriented vision of a better world.

Closely allied but aimed at another glaring global need is the online reconstruction of what *The Parable of the Three Villages 2012* reveals of the probable courses and library for the ancient **University of Osanto** (www.osantouniversity.com). Here the goal is to provide an inviting (i.e., fun-loving rather than deadly) model for working the moral keystone for building the better world into American and global higher education—where, at present, it’s generally woefully lacking.

David Loye’s study of moral evolution began in 1971 with research for his national award-winning book *The Healing of a Nation*. This

first made the case for a new moral oriented field of science to involve, but go beyond, the healing of individuals to the healing of nations, cultures, communities, and other organizations that now shape the world for better or worse.

Over the next four decades came a stream of books exploring his conviction that moral sensitivity and moral evolution has become the most crucial concern for both science and society in the 21st century.

Best known are books detailing his startling recovery of the long ignored “lost theory” in which Charles Darwin makes the case for moral sensitivity and love—rather than “survival of the fittest” and “selfish genes”—as prime drivers for human evolution.

For his reconstruction of the long ignored moral completion for Darwin’s theory of evolution in *Darwin’s Lost Theory: Bridge to a Better World, Darwin’s Second Revolution*, and other books Dr.Loye won the acclaim of leading scientists and educators in Europe and the U.S. “Revolutionary.” A work of “genius.” “Corrects an oversight in the history of science which has swerved the modern world off its track” are among many accolades (for more see www.davidloye.com).

Out of the Darwin work came Loye’s development of the world’s first practical, multilevel measure of human and general evolution, the Global Sounding. In response to the need for a Global Ethic—voiced by the Dalai Lama and the Union of Concerned Scientists, with notable prior development by theologian Hans Kung and the World Parliament of Religion—this new measure has been translated into the Global Sounding Moral Code. Pilot testing and scenario application of both measure and moral code to business, government, politics, economics, education, religion, the media, and a wide range of other fields is reported in *Measuring Evolution* and *Bankrolling Evolution*.

Grounded in both natural and social science, Loye’s new wave of free books available through the Osanto University Library and Book Store emerge from development over two decades of his *Moral*

Transformation Theory. Previously nibbled at in journals and other books, the new books unfold the scientific and spiritual adventure story of his discovery of an underlying consensus, within both progressive science and progressive spirituality, for six foundations for moral evolution and moral transformation (which surprisingly seem to point for point echo the Code for Osanto in *The Parable of the Three Villages* 2012).

Available for free reading and download, the seven new books rediscover goodness, redefine evil, and show how, despite the unprecedented challenges of our time, we can still build the better world. They include the trilogy: *The Glacier and the Flame I: Rediscovering Goodness*, *The Glacier and the Flame II: Redefining Evil*, and *The Glacier and the Flame III: A Fragment of a Vision*.

Additionally available for free download or onscreen reading are *The Science of Evil*; *Moral Sensitizing: A Guide to a New Method of Learning and Therapy for Teachers, Counselors, Ministers, and Self-healers*; and *Grandfather's Garden*, a bedtime reading book for parents and children. Already published and available through online book sellers is *The River and the Star: The Lost Story of the Great Explorers of the Better World*.
